# How to Recruit Volunteers for Your Neighborhood Emergency Response Team

17 practices for adding talent & enthusiastic support to your volunteer group

#### 1. Recruit all the time, even when the team is complete!

(Add a recruiting footnote to every article, every announcement, every speech, every email because turnover will be constant. Survival is not a loner activity -- you need your neighbors.)

#### 2. Know the kind of member you want.

(What values are essential? What won't work with your group?)

# 3. Know what skills you want.

(Need a particular background? Interest? Medical, military, scouting, camping, communications?)

# 4. Have an application procedure.

(Can be very simple, but shows you are serious.)

### 5. Describe the training they'll get.

(Our new team members get a vest and hand-held radio when training is complete.)

### 6. Dispel any myths about volunteering.

(How much time? How much physical activity? Any special skills?)

### 7. Clarify any liability.

(Describe limits and expectations. Know the "Good Samaritan Laws" in your state.)

#### 8. Proclaim the benefits to the volunteers!

("What's in it for me?" New friends, giving back, belonging to a team, learning new skills.)

#### 9. Extend a personal invitation.

(Make a phone call, hold a personal meeting, present to small groups.)

### 10. Find out what the volunteer is looking for.

(You may be surprised what you'll uncover!)

#### 11. Have take-home materials.

(Print a professional-looking brochure or flyer.)

### 12. Staff a table at fairs and community events.

(You may need signage, brochure holders, giveaways, etc.)

### 13. Schedule a talk at community group meetings.

(Show off your PowerPoint skills! Ask a lot of questions to get your audience involved.)

#### 14. Show volunteers in action.

(Get permission if you show a volunteer's ID – face, car, etc.)

#### 15. Publish articles.

(Churches, other groups are always looking for good articles for their newsletters or websites.)

#### 16. Promote online.

# 17. Keep the volunteers you have.

(Thank them publicly and privately, recognize them with badges, gear, etc.)
